

Mixed Age Classes

Parent comment sheets received this week have asked questions about the organisation of next year's classes. We have included the questions and answers, as they may be of help to others.

Why has there been no consultation or dialogue on the new arrangements earlier in the year/term?

Work on the school's budget happens in the summer term and the final decision about mixed age classes was ratified at a Governors' meeting on Wednesday 5th July. The Governors of the school have done everything possible to avoid having to reduce classes from seven to six. However, schools are funded on an understanding of one teacher to thirty pupils. There are currently 157 pupils in the school, instead of the capacity of 210. It is true that some pupils have benefited from small classes, but this model is not financially sustainable.

It would be very difficult for parents to be objective when considering the organisation of all children in classes across the school. Understandably, they have their own child's interests at heart. Decisions about the strategic direction of the school are made by the Governing Body on which there is parent representation.

Parents' comments about needing more information about the organisation of classes earlier in the term will be taken into account when sharing information in future years.

How will the teaching material to be allocated?

The National Curriculum says that schools are:

'...only required to teach the relevant programme of study by the end of the key stage. Within each key stage, schools therefore have the flexibility to introduce content earlier or later than set out in the programme of study.'

For many subjects, teaching and learning is already structured around a two-year rotation cycle. This will be adapted to ensure that each year group has complete coverage of the National Curriculum by the end of their current key stage. Details of the school curriculum on a year-by-year basis will be available on the school website in September. In mixed age classes, whole class teaching will be kept to a minimum within key subjects such as maths, with teaching targeted at individual ability groups. This is possible through classroom management and is a well-used strategy for ensuring that all needs in a mixed ability class are met.

Staff will look carefully at the previous curriculum covered and design a curriculum that reflects those areas that still need to be taught. This will be taught to match the needs of the pupils in the class.

Mixed Age classes are relatively common in Devon and there is a great deal or support and resources that the school can draw on to ensure effective teaching and learning for all.

Will the younger year group in a class learn the same as the older children in a class?

Sometimes. The school has always taught children in mixed ability groups. In all of our current classes, there is a wide range of ability, maturity and experience. In our present single age classes, work set is differentiated to meet the needs of the pupils regardless of their age group, this will continue to be the case in a mixed age class. All work is differentiated according to each child's ability. The staff are committed to enabling each child to reach their individual potential and enjoy being an active learner.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

Tracksuits or suitable sports clothing may be worn in the winter


*PE kits should be available in school every day & clearly marked with the child's name.

Jewellery, with the exception of watches and small stud earrings, is not allowed. Make-up and nail varnish should not be worn to school.

Torbay and Devon Civic Award at St Joseph's **Catholic Primary School.**

On Wednesday 5th July, pupils from St Joseph's Catholic Primary School, Newton Abbot, were presented with the Torbay and Devon Civic Award at a ceremony at Torquay Boys' Grammar School. The certificates were awarded to successful pupils by the Chair of both Torbay and Devon County Council.

The Torbay and Devon Civic Award does a great deal to develop children's character. It encourages them to be compassionate and to take responsibility for positive change. It supports them in leading purposeful and full lives and is great preparation for both secondary school and the workplace. This is the first year the Year 6 children of St Joseph's have taken part, and they report that working towards the award has supported them to work collaboratively and independently, supported the development of managing and organising events and that it makes them feel 'grown up'.

To achieve the award, which is based on the Duke Of Edinburgh Award scheme, pupils had to produce evidence to meet a number of challenges. The five main areas were:

Active Citizenship in their school community Active Citizenship in their home communities An active hobby

A non-active hobby

A Residential experience and adventure training

St Joseph's children also adopted a cause or charity which they felt strongly about. They researched it and found ways of supporting it such as: count the sweets in a jar, buy a brick, raffles and bake sales. They kept evidence for this in a portfolio which included photographs, certificates and diary entries of which all the children were very proud of. Finally, the children had to pass a rigorous assessment and present all their evidence to an external assessor.

We are very proud of our Year 6 children's achievements on their path to becoming Good Citizens.
