MESSAGE FROM HEAD OF SCHOOL



Dear Parents and Guardians,

As we move through May, I want to take a moment to celebrate our school community and share a few reflections.

First, a huge well done to our Year 6 pupils. We are immensely proud of their calm, determined attitude throughout the SATs period. They approached each paper with resilience, kindness to one another, and a real sense of purpose. SATs assess a narrow slice of learning; they do not measure creativity, curiosity, empathy, teamwork, humour, or the many leadership qualities our pupils show every day. In those wider measures, our Year 6 children truly excel. They have been wonderful role models for our younger pupils—showing how to work hard, support friends, and keep things in perspective.

That spirit runs through the whole school. I am consistently proud of the way our children conduct themselves, and visitors regularly comment on the calm atmosphere, purposeful learning, and kindness they see in our corridors and classrooms. Strong “behaviour for learning” is a real strength of our community. Of course, children sometimes get things wrong—that’s part of growing up—and we’re here to help them put it right. Our approach is restorative and relational: we listen, help children understand the impact of their choices, and support them to repair any harm. Together, we agree clear next steps so everyone can move forward feeling safe, valued, and ready to learn. It’s about high expectations, consistent routines, and the belief that every child can learn from a mistake and try again.

Feeling safe underpins all of this. Safeguarding is part of everyday life in our school, and we all play a role in it. Our children can confidently explain how they are kept safe—around school, on trips, and online—and what to do if something doesn’t feel right. They know the trusted adults they can speak to and the simple steps for getting help for themselves or a friend. We build this understanding through regular conversations in class and assemblies, and through our PSHE and online-safety curriculum. Our staff are well trained and always ready to listen, and we encourage families to talk with us too.

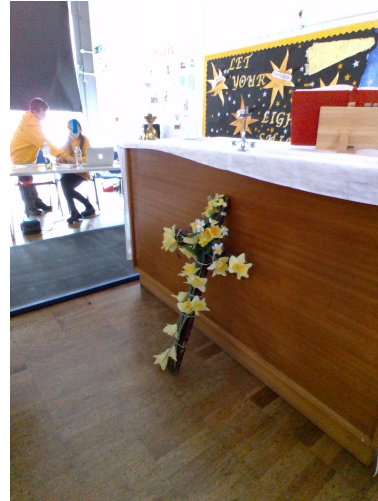
Thank you to all our pupils, families and staff for everything you do to make our school such a warm, purposeful place to learn.

THE CATHOLIC LIFE OF OUR SCHOOL - ASCENSION DAY LITURGY

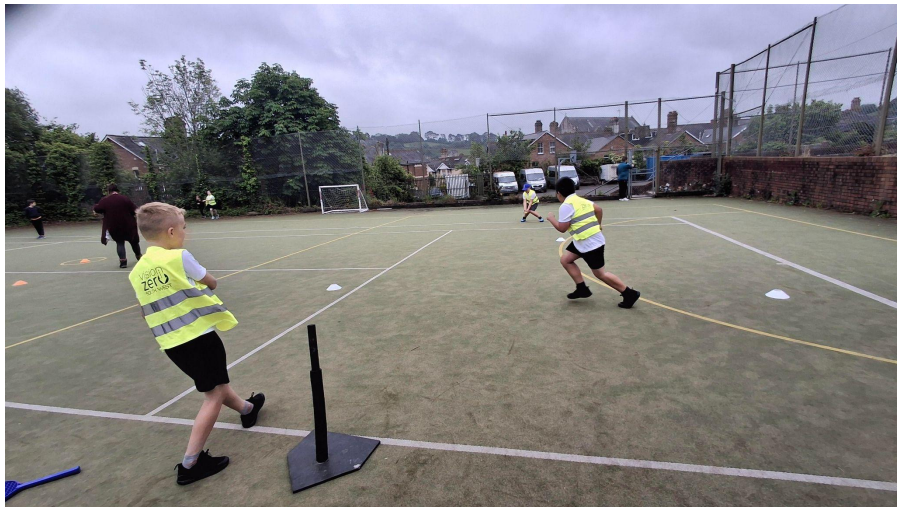

CURRICULUM HIGHLIGHTS



May in St Francis

This half term the children have been growing Runner beans and Strawberries, they have been fascinated at how they have been growing and can identify parts of the plants. We had a surprise visit from a Giant who was in our focus story- "Jack and the Beanstalk". The children's imaginations have been incredible when reciting the story. We have enjoyed spending so much time outside in the sunshine, noticing differences in our environment and have been on nature scavenger hunts. We even made some kites to fly when we had a windy day! In PE we are practising for Sports Day, the children have been very competitive!

May in St Vincent

In Science, we planted cress seeds and carried out our own experiment to help us learn what plants need to grow. We planted one set of seeds with both light and water, one without water, and one without light. We have enjoyed observing the changes and discussing our predictions and results together.

We also had our Teddy Bears' Picnic this month. Although the weather meant we had to move our picnic indoors, we still had a wonderful time! The children especially enjoyed focusing on their oracy skills by sharing ideas, speaking clearly, and listening carefully to one another during our activities.

In Music, we have loved exploring different instruments, including the jumbie jams. The children have been learning about rhythm, beat, and how to play together as a group.

In Art, we have continued developing our sculpture skills. After lots of practice and creativity, the children completed their final bird sculptures, and we are very proud of their fantastic work and attention to detail.

In Geography, we have been busy learning about Europe! We had a European day where we enjoyed dressing up, bringing in food and presenting facts to the class on our chosen country. Can you tell which countries we are representing?



In Science, we have been learning all about how light travels and is reflected from different surfaces. We have spent some time investigating and proving how light from the sun can be dangerous. As Scientists, we are learning different ways to record our results.

As designers, we investigated torches, sketched our ideas, and chose materials with a user in mind. We then built simple circuits with batteries, switches, and LEDs. Using safe tools, we crafted and assembled the torch bodies, tested brightness and beam focus, —finishing with working torches we evaluated and proudly used. We found this quite a tricky experience. But it is always good to have a challenge.

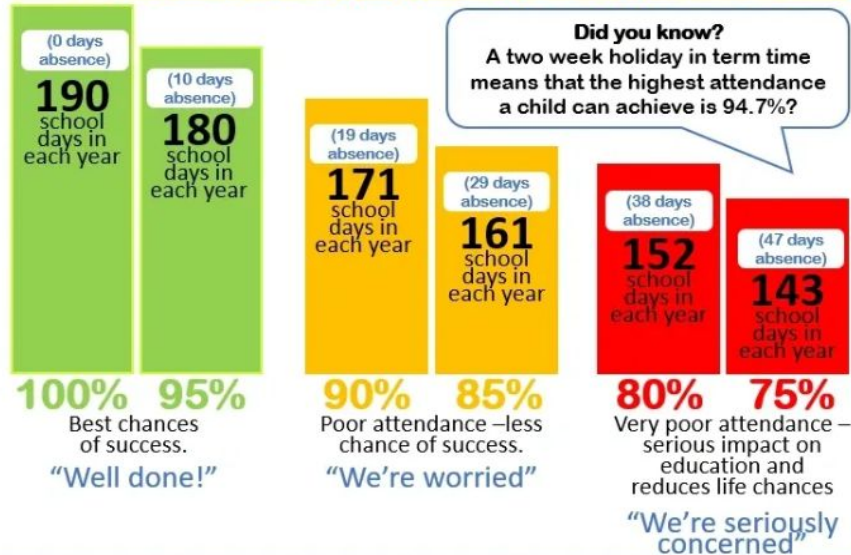
If your child is late for morning registration, arriving late at school after 9am, please ensure you or their accompanying adult reports to the school office to ensure that they are registered.

Attendance Roadmap

In line with the DfE Statutory Guidance (in force from 19th August 2024) we offer a supportive, stepped, attendance approach. We will offer a welcoming ethos with high expectations for all. We will assess data to identify absence trends & use preventative discussions/meetings with families to listen, understand & support to remove barriers. Where needed, we will formalise support to nurture improvement with Attendance Contracts & as a last resort we will consider intensifying support &/or enforce legal sanctions.



Did you know, arriving after the register has closed (30 mins from school starting) = an absence?



Did you know, 90% attendance = approx. 95 missed lessons/hours of learning?

STEP 1 - Identify, Assess & Prevent

Our daily actions & processes aim to promote relationship building with children & families to prevent absence. This involves monitoring data trends & absence patterns to inform our conversations with you (& your child where age allows). The trigger for conversations is where absence is at risk of reaching the new National Threshold (**10 sessions (10 half days/5 days) within a 10 week rolling period**). Other daily actions involve promoting attendance positively, using praise & incentives, swift absence follow up, email &/or letter communication to raise your awareness of emerging concerns, processing requested or unrequested 'Term Time Exceptional Absence' & doing Home Visits to meet our safeguarding duties as required.

STEP 2 - Early Absence Support

We move to this step if the National Threshold for absence is met (authorised or unauthorised) to prevent further absence occurring. Discussions & meetings will be offered to identify if early support or reasonable adjustments are needed. This will be done using discussions &/or meetings to create a supportive action plan. An Early Help Assessment (EHA) may be required for some support to be accessed along with a Team Around the Family (TAF) Meeting Process

Please talk to us about how we can support you &/or your child at any time.

STEP 3 - Formalised Support

Where absence continues & initial support needs to be increased an Attendance Contract (AC) will be offered to formalise support. This is a 3-6 month nurturing plan of improvement to prevent further escalation. Achievable & individual targets will be set & reviewed regularly. Medical &/or other information will be actively sought at this point if required to work collaboratively with you & other agencies. An AC can run alongside other meetings e.g., TAF meeting.



Did you know, 90% attendance = 4 weeks of absence over a year?

STEP 4 - Warnings - Concerns Remain

Where STEP 2 or STEP 3 support has been unsuccessful &/or declined, a 'Formal Warning' if AC has failed, or a 'Notice to Improve' Letter if no AC appropriate, will be issued to reinforce the need for immediate improvement. A Family Court Order such as an Education Supervision Order will also be considered as an alternative to prosecution.



Did you know, good attendance increases academic success?



STEP 5 - Legal Action - No Improvement

Legal action (Penalty Notice or Prosecution) MAY be requested from the Local Authority (LA) if Unauthorised Term Time Absence is taken, or if overall absence continues to occur & reaches or exceeds the National Threshold for absence, despite STEPS 1-4 being attempted. Statutory Guidance States a Referral to Children's Social Care for children with 'Severe Absence' (less than 50%) should be considered to obtain 'Intense Support'.

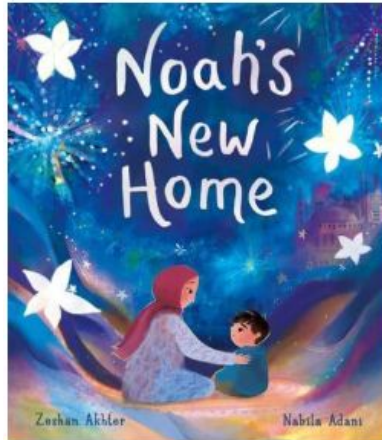
PENALTY NOTICES & LEGAL ACTION

1st Offence (after 19th August 2024) of **Term Time Leave** &/or **Irregular Attendance** (10 sessions of Unauthorised Absence or more) = Fine of £160 per parent, per child if paid within 28 days. If paid within 21 days fine is reduced to £80 per parent, per child.
2nd Offence within 3 years (from 19th August 2024) = Fine of £160 per parent, per child payable within 28 days, no reduction available.
3rd Offence within 3 years (from 19th August 2024) NO PENALTY NOTICE considered. The case will be presented to **Magistrates' Court** under s444(1) or (1a) of the Education Act. If found guilty, a fine of up to £2500 per parent, per child can be issued. Convictions for s444(1a) offences will show on DBS record.

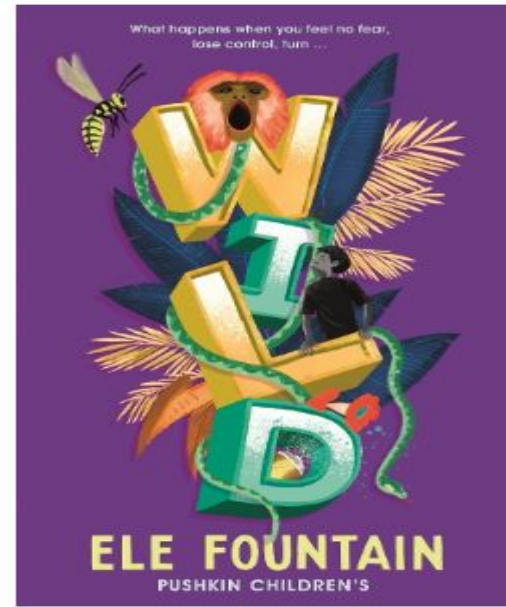


BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS

Covering themes of gang peer pressure, loss of a parent, attention-seeking behaviour and bravado, Wild is a book with bite – perfect for book club discussion and use as an impetus for creative writing.

Operation Encompass is the reporting to schools, prior to the start of the next school day, when a child or young person has exposed to, or involved in, any domestic incident.

Operation Encompass will ensure that a member of the school staff, known as a Key Adult, is trained to allow them to liaise with the police and to use the information that has been shared, in confidence, while ensuring that the school is able to make provision for possible difficulties experienced by children, or their families, who have been involved in, or exposed to, a domestic abuse incident.
